****FAIR PARKING RULES****

Passes are issued for the current Fair year by Fair Park Staff – based on need & limited to 1 type of pass per family. For use by Livestock exhibitors only.

- **CAMPGROUND PARKING:** Valid for parking in the campground ONLY. One campground parking pass per assigned campsite. If found parked elsewhere on the grounds, the vehicle will need to be moved immediately or be towed. **NEW FOR 2023: Emergency contact information must be listed on your pass and visible from the front windshield or you may be subject to towing if in an unapproved area.**

- **GROUNDS PARKING:** Valid for parking in the gravel area along the road by Gate #11 or on the grass area behind the shack along the road and fence ONLY. Parking anywhere else on the grounds is not allowed and may be towed. **NEW FOR 2023: Emergency contact information must be listed on your pass and visible from the front windshield or you may be subject to towing if in an unapproved area.**

- **LOADING/UNLOADING PASS:** Valid only for loading & unloading by the barns prior to 10:00 a.m. NOT ALLOWED AFTER 10:00 a.m. No extended parking allowed with this pass. **NEW FOR 2023: Emergency contact information must be listed on your pass and visible from the front windshield or you may be subject to towing if in an unapproved area.**

- **NO PASS:** No entry without Fair Management approval. They may park on the road and be driven by gator if they are entertainment or otherwise have a purpose to be there.

- **HANDICAP PARKING:** There are several spots marked for handicap access. They must present Fair or Concert tickets prior to being allowed in.

***Using passes from a previous Fair year is strictly prohibited.** Any passes from previous Fair years being used will be confiscated & may result in future parking/loading privileges being revoked.

NEW IN 2023- TRAILERS STAYING ON THE GROUNDS WILL ALSO NEED A PASS WITH EMERGENCY CONTACT INFORMATION LISTED AND PLACED IN A HIGHLY VISIBLE AREA TO FAIR PERSONNEL.

NEW IN 2023- There will be a limited number of reserved parking spaces (apprx. 50) available for purchase located along the fence line by Gate 12. Priority will be given to livestock exhibitors and sold on a first come, first serve basis. Only 1 pass per family is allowed. The pass can be transferred between vehicles but must be visible in the front windshield at all times. The cost for the pass is \$50.00 and is good for the entire duration of the Fair.

TYPES OF JUDGING

Danish Judging: This is the traditional system, in which all exhibits of the same division are presented simultaneously to the judge. The judge evaluates each exhibit but is permitted to give a maximum of 25% ribbons within each color in each division. This style is used primarily on the animal departments and open division entries.

Face-to-Face Judging: This form of judging allows more flexibility for judge and exhibitor. Youth bring their projects to the judge within the allotted time and talk to the judge about their exhibit. Based on the variables from the “face-to-face” discussion, the judge awards the ribbon and premium which he/she believes is appropriate. This style is used in junior division departments exhibited in the Ziegler Family Exposition Center.

Premium Listings:

1 st Blue	= Excellent
2 nd Red	= Very Good
3 rd White	= Good
4 th Pink	= Needs Improvement

JUDGING

1. Exhibits in any department must be worthy, in the estimations of the judge, to qualify for a prize.
2. Not more than one premium will be awarded any exhibitor upon any one prize number.
3. Any person residing in Washington County is eligible to enter Open Departments. Junior Department exhibitors must be a member of a recognized youth group.
4. Any exhibitor who shall attempt to interfere with deliberations or decisions of the judges will be excluded from competition in that division.
5. Any person making a false entry will forfeit premium.
6. All judging will be done by qualified judges registered with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.
7. The report of the judges must be made out and returned to the Manager’s Office at the completion of the Department Judging.
8. No person Except the Manager and Assistants will be allowed to examine the entry books until after the awards have been made.
9. All premiums, both regular and special, are the absolute property of the Washington County Ag & Industrial Society and will be paid as such.
10. All articles competing for premiums will be under the control of the Superintendent and must not be removed from the grounds until after the last say except by written permission of the Fair Manager. Failure to abide by this rule, exhibitor forfeits all premiums.
11. No articles shall compete for more than one premium unless as part of a collection, nor will premiums be awarded when articles are not worthy in the estimation of the judges, even though there will be no competition.

EXHIBITOR INSTRUCTIONS

All entries and payments must be turned in to the Fair Park office by 4:30 pm on June 30th, 2023. No entries submitted after June 30th, 2023, will be accepted. NO EXCEPTIONS.

IN ALL CASES OTHERWISE NOTED, ONLY ONE ENTRY MAY BE MADE UNDER ONE CLASS BY AN EXHIBITOR

1. **All entry forms must be received no later 4:30pm on Wednesday, June 30th.** Entry forms can be dropped off in the Fair Park Office or be submitted online at www.wcfairpark.com/fair. Entry forms will not be accepted after this date.
2. All entry forms must include exhibitor name, complete address, department entered, the division and class number, and fair premium book description. If not completed in full, the entry may be eliminated. Junior Class **MUST** enter Club Name or Organization Name, Grade, and age. If showing livestock, a premise ID is also required.
3. All entries must be made as indicated in the premium list.
4. An error on an entry form may result in a loss of premium.
5. Everyone, exhibitors included, will need a season wristband or admission ticket to enter the Fair after the gates open.

RECYCLING FEE (per animal)

A recycling fee will be charged for each animal exhibited in the Pleasure, Draft Horse, Dairy, Beef, Llama, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Rabbits, and Poultry Departments. **Absolutely no refunds on recycling fees.**

Exhibitor Code of Conduct Rules:

1. Adhere to rules and policies outlined in Washington County Fair Premium Book.
2. Conduct yourself in a courteous and respectful manner.
3. Use appropriate language, exhibit good sportsmanship, and provide a positive role model.
4. Comply with local, state, and federal laws.
5. Respect others' property and privacy rights.
6. Abstain from any type of abuse- physical, emotional, harassment, hazing and bullying.
7. Accept personal responsibility for behavior.
8. Adhere to safety rules.

Consequences for violations of Code of Conduct:

1. Removal from exhibiting at the Fair up to and including removal from the fairgrounds.
2. Forfeiture or repayment of fees and damages.
3. Sanctions on participating in future years.
4. A representative from the County Fair (Director or Fair Committee Chair), and a member of the Non-Animal Committee or Livestock Committee will meet with the exhibitor to inform them of the consequence. If the exhibitor is in Junior Class, a parent or guardian will be notified.
5. A written letter outlining the decision will be mailed within 10 business days of the last day of the County Fair.

DISQUALIFICATION PROCESS (Junior and Open Class Exhibits)

I. General Process:

- A. The work of the exhibit must be done by the Exhibitor.
- B. If the Exhibitor enters an exhibit which he/she has not made, or in the case of an animal, cared for, the exhibit will be disqualified.
- C. The exhibit may be disqualified by the judge during the judging process or by a respective department at any time during the Fair.
- D. Premiums for all exhibits the Exhibitor has exhibited in that year will be forfeited.
- E. The exhibit will be removed from the Washington County Fair.
- F. A representative from the Non-Animal Committee or Livestock Committee and County Fair Staff will meet with the Exhibitor to inform them of the disqualification.
- G. A verbal disqualification will be given to the Exhibitor. If the Exhibitor is in Junior Class, a parent or guardian will be notified.
- H. A written letter outlining the decision will be mailed to the Exhibitor within 10 business days of the last day of the County Fair. If the Exhibitor is in Open Class, the decision will be sent by the AIS Board and/or Fair Park Staff. If the Exhibitor is a Junior Class Exhibitor, the letter will be sent by Fair Park Staff.

For a second infraction/disqualification, the Exhibitor will be disqualified from exhibiting at the Washington County Fair for two years. If a third infraction/disqualification occurs, the Exhibitor will not be allowed to exhibit at the Washington County Fair.

II. Appeals Process:

- A. The Exhibitor has the right to appeal the written decision.
- B. The Exhibitor shall submit their written request to appeal within 10 business days of the date of the written decision to the following:
 - If the Exhibitor is in Junior or Open Class – to the AIS Board whose address is:

 - For Non-Animal Exhibits: The Appeals Committee will consist of three members from the Non-Animal Committee. One alternate will be named.
 - Livestock Exhibits: The Appeals Committee will consist of three members of the Livestock Committee. One alternate will be named.
 - The AIS Board may appoint additional members if they deem necessary.
- C. The Appeals Committee will review the written Decision and the exhibitor's written request to appeal, with any supporting documentation, to make their determination. Their determination shall also be in writing, sent to the Exhibitor and shall be final. There shall be no further appeal.

For all other projects, please see the respective department in the Fair Premium Book for entry information and judging times.

All animals must be identified (ear tag or health papers, tattoo) with Department Superintendent before being unloaded. Health papers will be kept on file during the Fair in the Livestock Office and turned over to the Fair Office to maintain for a 5-year period. Failure to abide by this rule will result in immediate removal of animals from grounds and forfeiture of show rights.

INSTRUCTIONS WHEN BRINGING IN EXHIBITS

1. Pick up your exhibitor tickets in the Fair Park Office until the Friday before the Fair begins. Starting Monday of Fair week, pick up will be in the Ziegler Building lobby.
2. Take your exhibitor tags and exhibits to the appropriate department area.
3. The superintendent will attach the exhibit tag(s) to the exhibit and put your exhibit in place after being judged.
4. It is understood that the exhibitor shows the display at his/her own risk, and that neither Washington County Fair nor Washington County is liable to any extent for any damage the exhibitor's display may suffer.
5. In order to show livestock at the Washington County Fair, an exhibitor must be 8 years old or older as of January 1st of the current Fair year or have finished the 3rd grade by time of Fair. The only exception to this rule is for those that choose to show in Little Squealers, Little Shepherds, and/or Half Pint/Little Britches.

THE NORTH GATE (#11) WILL BE CLOSED FROM 4:00PM UNTIL 7:00PM RELEASE. Open Division Exhibits will be kept at Fair Park for one week. Exhibits will be disposed of if not picked up within this time.

JUNIOR FAIR DIVISION GENERAL RULES

1. The exhibits in this division are open only to members on good standing of a Washington County organization located in Washington County, including 4-H Clubs, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, FHA, Jr. Holstein Association, Pioneers, Jr. Polled Hereford Associations, and other qualified groups which are approved by the Washington County AIS at least 30 days prior to opening day of the fair. By meeting the expectations of the youth organization, they are a part of, youth exhibitors earn the privilege to represent that organization as an exhibitor at the Washington County Fair. Youth exhibitors should check with leaders and administrative staff of the organization they represent to verify that they are meeting the expectations of that organization before entering to exhibit at the Washington County Fair.
2. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor since the previous County Fair.
3. Exhibits are to be made only on the project or projects in which the exhibitor is enrolled. The enrollment is to be vouched for by the leader of the youth organization or parent concerned.
4. 4-H members competing for premiums must meet all the rules and requirements of 4-H club work. Premiums will not be paid to anyone not enrolled as a 4-H member in good standing. The Fair Board reserves the right to withhold premium checks for exhibitors not completing all requirements for project.
5. Exhibits are open to youth K5 – 13th grade or no more than 19 years of age as of January 1st of the current fair year, depending on the grade or age rule governing the Recognized Washington County organization to which the youth belong.
6. In addition to champion ribbons, merit ribbons may be presented to those articles deemed outstanding by the judge. State Fair selections may also be made.
7. Exhibitors are allowed to show an exhibit from another county providing space allows.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK GENERAL RULES

- Not more than 5 dairy or 2 steers may be shown by any one exhibitor.
- In order to show livestock at the Washington County Fair, an exhibitor must be 8 years old or older as of January 1st of the current Fair year and have completed 3rd grade by time of Fair. The only exception to this rule is for those that choose to show in Little Squealers, Little Shepherds, and/or Half Pint/Little Britches.
- Barns will be closed from 10:00 pm to 6:00 am. Any exceptions to entering the barns during these hours is at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- An animal may NOT be shown in both Junior and Open Divisions, except to complete a group division in the Open Show.
- All health papers for animals must be presented to the superintendent before animals are unloaded. **Animals without proper health papers will not be allowed to unload on the fairgrounds.**
- Animals entered must be placed with the club indicated on the entry form. If an exhibitor wishes to put their animals in another group, they must contact the superintendent of the department no later than 15 days before entry day of the fair. Adjustments will be made at the discretion of the superintendent.
- Exhibitor must furnish own straw and feed.
- See Page 9 for time(s) livestock should be in place.
- Exhibitors are responsible to clean up manure from their animals any time the animals are out of the barn.
- Registration papers must accompany all registered animals and be shown to Superintendent on entry day before unloading animal(s).
- All animals shown must be owned by exhibitors, exhibitor's family, or resident employee of the

owner of the animal.

- Animals must be shown by exhibitors except where permission is granted to have a substitute do the showing. The substitute must be a youth member from Washington County.
- The appearance of a person showing an animal in the judging ring and his ability of showmanship will be considered by the judge in awarding ribbons. This is very important and will be stressed.
- It is recommended that anyone exhibiting livestock, dress in neat clean attire for the show ring. The customary “cover all” or usual barn clothes are discouraged from use in the show ring. No farm name may be worn during showing.
- Control of Animals – Livestock exhibitors must be able to bring animals into the show ring to be handled and judged in order to receive premiums in any division or be eligible for the Livestock Sale.
- The only individuals allowed in the show ring during judging of all animal species will be the exhibitor and individuals wearing a vest with the working “LIVESTOCK OFFICIAL.” These officials will be determined by the Department Superintendent. Any other individual in the show ring during judging will result in disciplinary action.
- No sedatives may be used on livestock.
- If you are planning to stay overnight with your livestock, a pass will be required. Passes will be available in the Fair Park Office; Tues. – Sat. during business hours. Livestock exhibitors ONLY will be allowed overnight on the fairgrounds. Not brothers, sisters, or friends.
- Any animal not under control will be removed from the fairgrounds at the discretion of the Livestock Coordinator and the Department Superintendent. If necessary, the matter will be referred to the Fair Director.
- Exhibitors are required to wash cattle at wash racks only.

STEVE JANZ - JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE CHAIRMAN

The rules for the Washington County Fair Livestock Sale were provided to all project members in the packet at the time of weigh-in and printed in the Animal Science Handbook. LIVESTOCK WEIGH-IN

Fair weigh-in: All animals must be in place Tuesday on or before 12:30pm.

Lambs will be weighed in pen by pen starting at 1:00pm. Swine to be weighed in pen by pen immediately following lambs. No free weigh-ins for lambs or swine.

Beef weights taken from 1:00pm until finished at approximately 2:00pm. Clubs will be released to the scale 1 at a time to stop lines and confusion.

EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS

See Dept. 132, Division B for information on educational displays. Entry must be made by the club on an official entry form, postmarked June 30th, to be eligible.

OVERNIGHT PASSES

- **Youth or adults that plan to stay on the grounds** between 11:00pm and 6:00am will need to obtain an overnight pass. All junior fair exhibitors, even if over the age of 18, are considered as youth and will need to follow the procedures and requirements for a youth pass.
- **Overnight passes for youth** will be issued only to people exhibiting livestock having an important and compelling need to stay at the fair. Friends or others will not be eligible for overnight passes.
- **Adults and/or youth wishing to obtain an overnight pass** can pick up the applications at the Fair Park Office. Exhibitors are encouraged to complete and turn in the application to The Fair Park Office by June 30th. However, applications will be accepted no later than July 12th, Applications will only be considered on an emergency basis after this date.
- **All youth staying overnight** will need to be under the supervision of a parent, legal guardian, or a chaperone. - - Chaperones must be identified by parents, be over 21 years of age, obtain an overnight pass, and have completed the youth protection program. Chaperones are limited to supervising 10 youth.
- **Pick up of passes is handled as follows:**
Beef, sheep, swine and dairy: Passes are available for pick up in the Livestock Office on Tuesday through Saturday of the Fair during regular business hours.
Llamas, alpacas and goats: Fair Park Office staff will give the passes to the appropriate Superintendent or participants directly.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Barns will be closed from 10:00 pm to 6:00 am. Any exceptions to entering the barns during these hours is at the discretion of the Superintendent.

Exhibitors are prohibited from bringing ATV, utility vehicles, or golf carts and are not allowed on the premises.

****IMPORTANT****

- **SUNDAY CLOSURE:** The North Gate (#11) will close at 4:00 pm on Sunday and no one is allowed to enter without Fair Management approval prior to 7:00 pm when Livestock exhibits are released and the Fair closes. Draft Horse exhibitors may enter the grounds from Gate #1 at 6:00 pm.
- Exhibitors are prohibited from bringing ATV, utility vehicles, or golf carts and are not allowed on the premises.

HEALTH REGULATIONS

Junior Fair exhibits will be subjected to the same requirements as for other livestock at the Fair.

ABSOLUTELY NO CHANGES CAN BE MADE AT OR DURING THE FAIR!!

FAIR VETERINARIAN RESPONSIBILITIES

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture Trade and Consumer Protection establish rules that fairs must follow to reduce the risk of animal health concerns. One of those requirements is:

If a fair or livestock exhibition in this state lasts for more than 24 hours, the sponsors of the fair or exhibition shall appoint a licensed veterinarian to conduct a daily inspection of all livestock at the fair or exhibition. For a complete listing of the rule, please see the health requirements section of the fair book.

The veterinarian employed by the fair does come to the grounds each day. Their schedule depends on their other responsibilities and is usually not at a set time each day. When the veterinarian comes to the fair, they will check with the Livestock Office to see if there are any concerns or animals to check. They will then walk through the livestock areas and observe animals for any concerns.

If you have an animal that you would like the veterinarian to check when they are on the grounds, please leave the in-livestock office. It will then be provided to the veterinarian on the next visit. The veterinarian will check your animal. However, if any treatment is administered you are responsible for the costs of the treatment.

If an animal needs immediate attention, it is the responsibility of the exhibitor to contact their own veterinarian for any attention or treatment.

If you have any questions, please speak to the Superintendent of your department or someone at the Livestock Office.

2023 REGULATIONS FOR STATE AID

Changes made are in compliance with the WI. Dept. of Ag. And Consumer Protection.

CHAPTER ATCP 160

WI. AG., TRADE & CONSUMER PROTECTION

SUBCHAPTER 1

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS AND DEFINITIONS

ATCP 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- (1)** “Breed class” and “breeding class” mean a specific breed within a class such as holstein in the dairy class.
- (2)** “Class” means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- (2m)** “Conference judging” means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
- (3)** “Danish judging system” means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second-, third- and fourth-class selections as provided in s. [ATCP 160.91 \(4\) \(b\)](#).
- (4)** “Department” as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, “department” means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
- (5)** “Division” means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
- (6)** “Entry class” means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
- (7)** “Exotic domestic animal” means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
- (7e)** “Face-to-face judging” means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:
 - (a) Get acquainted.
 - (b) Learn the background of the exhibit.
 - (c) Self-evaluation.
 - (d) Evaluator comment.
 - (e) Parting.
- (7m)** “Fair” means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. [93.23 \(1\) \(b\)](#) or [\(c\)](#), Stats.
- (7s)** “Fair board” means the governing entity of a fair.
- (8)** “Lot” or “lot number” means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
- (9)** “Market class” means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.
- (10)** “Premium” means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
- (11)** “Regular judging system” means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. [ATCP 160.91 \(4\) \(c\)](#).
- (12)** “Self determined project” means a project that meets all of the following criteria:
 - (a) It is approved by the fair board.
 - (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.
 - (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.
 - (d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.
- (13)** “Youth organization” means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programming.

ATCP 160.02 Premium requirements. (1) GENERAL. (a) The state aid authorized by s. [93.23 \(1\)](#), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. [ATCP 10](#) that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft. (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair. (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason. (e) No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class. (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) PREMIUM LISTS. (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. [ATCP 160.92 \(3\) \(c\)](#). (b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request. (c) Sections [ATCP 160.01](#) through [160.07](#) and [160.91](#) shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested. **(3) ENTRY FEES.** (a) A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee or charge stall rents for animals, or both. (b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket. **(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES.** (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year. (b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship. (c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department: 1. Clothing revue. 2. Demonstrations. 3. Favorite foods revue. 4. Dogs. 4m. Cats. 5. Small animals. 6. Rocketry. 7. Shooting sports. 7m. Mechanical projects. 8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7. (d) If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements. A fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid. **(1)** No fair society or other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society. **(2)** State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state. **(3)** State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. [ATCP 160.02 \(4\)](#). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. [ATCP 160.49 \(7\)](#). **(4)** State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground.

ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements. **(1)** The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class. **(2)** All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. [ATCP 160.09](#). **(3)** State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits. **(4)** State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal. **(5)** The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements. **(1)** Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department. **(2)** (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless

those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration. (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed. (3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals. (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed. (5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

ATCP 160.08 Class definitions; individual classes. (1) DAIRY CATTLE. (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year. (b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. (c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. (h) A 2-year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened. (i) A 3-year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year. (j) A 4-year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year. (2) BEEF CATTLE. (a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit. (b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. (f) A 2-year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year. (4) SWINE. (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A fair board may subdivide this entry class into January-born and February-born sows or boars. (d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year. (5) SHEEP. (a) A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year. (b) A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year. (c) A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year. (d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in pars. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.

ATCP 160.09 Class definitions; group classes. (1) DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE. (a) A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, or the summer yearling, bull and heifer classes, with both sexes to be represented. (b) A dairy and beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. In either a dairy or beef breed get of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor. (c) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals of any age or sex which are the produce of one cow. (d) A group of 3 best female cattle shall consist of 3 animals of any age which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor. (2) SWINE. A pen of 3 feeder pigs shall consist of swine of either sex each weighing between 40 and 60 pounds. Any male pigs included in the pen shall be castrated and healed. (3) SHEEP. (a) A get of sire shall consist of 4 lambs or yearlings, or both, of either sex, from one sire, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor. (b) An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes and 2 ewe lambs which are owned by the exhibitor. (c) A junior division pair of lambs may include a spring or fall ram and spring or fall ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor. (d) A junior division flock shall be comprised of 3 sheep consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling ewe, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

ATCP 160.10 Premium lists. The uniform premium lists in this subchapter are the amounts on which state premium aid may be paid to a fair. State premium aid is also limited to the classes set forth in this subchapter. Maximum premiums are listed in dollar amounts for 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places for each entry class within a premium level.

A fair board may establish classes based on breed or sex. A fair board may establish weight limits for each entry class. If 11 or more animals are entered in any entry class, that class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal subclasses and each subclass may be judged as a separate entry class. An exhibitor may enter up to 3 animals under this subsection and may receive up to 2 premiums in any entry class under this subsection. (b) *Feeder calf.* A feeder calf shall be under 17 weeks old. The fair board may establish a single entry class under this paragraph, or 2 separate entry classes based on weight. For each entry class, the fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$11.00, \$9.00, \$7.00 and \$5.00. (c) *Market steer or heifer.* A market steer or heifer shall be at least 17 weeks old. The fair board may establish a single entry class under this paragraph, or up to 3 separate entry classes based on weight. For each entry class, the fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$12.00, \$10.00, \$8.00 and \$6.00.

ATCP 160.13 Swine; department 3. For each swine entry class under sub. (1) or (2), the fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$7.00, \$6.00, \$5.00 and \$4.00. **(1) BREED CLASSES.** (a) Boar; junior yearling. (b) Boar; senior pig. (c) Boar; senior spring, January. (d) Boar; senior spring, February. (e) Boar; junior spring pig. (f) Sow; junior yearling. (g) Sow; senior pig. (h) Sow; senior spring, January. (i) Sow; senior spring, February. (j) Sow; junior spring pig. **(2) MARKET CLASSES.** A fair board may establish market swine entry classes, based on breed, sex, or weight. Swine in each class shall be raised to be sold at market and shall be shown by weight. The fair board may establish weight limits for each entry class but may not limit an entry class by age. If 11 or more swine are entered in any entry class, that class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal subclasses, and each subclass may be judged as a separate class. An exhibitor may enter up to 3 swine in entry classes under this subsection and may receive up to 2 premiums in any entry class under this subsection.

ATCP 160.14 Sheep; department 4. In each entry class under subs. (1) to (3), a fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00 and \$3.00. **(1) BREED CLASSES.** (a) Spring ram lamb. (b) Winter ram lamb. (c) Fall ram lamb. (d) Pen of 2 ram lambs, bred and owned by the exhibitor. (e) Yearling ram. (f) Spring ewe lamb. (g) Winter ewe lamb. (h) Fall ewe lamb. (i) Pen of 2 ewe lambs, bred and owned by the exhibitor. (j) Yearling ewe. (k) Pen of 2 yearling ewes, bred and owned by the exhibitor. (L) Mature ewe. (m) Get of sire. (n) Exhibitor’s flock. **(2) MARKET CLASSES.** A fair board may establish market lamb entry classes, based on breed, sex, or weight. Lambs in each class shall be raised to be sold at market and shall be shown by weight. The fair board may establish weight limits for each entry class but may not limit an entry class by age. If 11 or more lambs are entered in any entry class, that class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal subclasses, and each subclass may be judged as a separate class. An

exhibitor may enter up to 3 lambs in entry classes under this subsection and may receive up to 2 premiums in any entry class under this subsection. **(3) MARKET WOOL/FLEECE SHOW CLASS.** A market wool show class or classes may be established at the discretion of the fair board. **(4) DAIRY SHEEP.** A fair board may establish one or more dairy sheep entry classes, and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00. **(5) SHEARING.** Sheep shown under this section shall meet the following requirements: (a) Wool breeds shall be shown with 2 inches or less of fleece. (b) Dairy breeds shall be slick shorn. (c) Breeds other than those in pars. (a) and (b) shall be shown with not more than one inch of fleece on any part of the animal’s body.

ATCP 160.15 Goats; department 5. (1) BREED CLASSES. A fair board may establish entry classes under subs. (2) to (4) in any of the following breed classes established by the board: (a) A class for any single breed of goats. (b) A “combined purebreds” class consisting of 2 or more breeds, none of which is established as a separate class under par.(a). (c) A class for any recorded grade of goats that is eligible for registry. (d) A class for goats that do not qualify in any class established under pars. (a) to (c). **(2) DAIRY GOATS; ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS.** A fair board may, for any dairy goat breed category established under sub. (1), establish any of the following entry classes and pay first–place to fourth–place premiums in each entry class at the following applicable premium levels: (a) Premium level one: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00, \$2.00. 1. Junior doe kid less than 4 months old. 2. Senior doe kid at least 4 months but less than 7 months old. 3. Junior yearling doe at least 7 months but less than 12 months old. 4. Senior yearling doe at least 12 months but less than 24 months old and not in milk. (b) Premium level 2: \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00. 1. Yearling milker under 2 years old and in milk. 2. Junior milker at least 2 years old but under 3 years old and in milk. 3. Mature milker at least 3 years old but under 5 years old. 4. Aged milker at least 5 years old. 5. Junior get of sire. A junior get of sire entry shall consist of 3 does under 2 years old that are not in milk and are the get of one sire. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor. 6. Senior get of sire. A senior get of sire entry shall consist of 3 does that are the get of one sire. At least one of the does shall be in milk. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor, but all of the exhibitors shall be in the senior age group. 7. Produce of dam. A produce of dam entry shall consist of 2 does of any age that are the produce of one dam. Both animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor. 8. Dam and daughter. A dam and daughter entry shall consist of one doe of any age and its dam. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor. 9. Exhibitor’s herd. An exhibitor’s herd entry shall consist of one doe under one year old, one doe at least one year old but less than 2 years old, and one doe at least 2 years old. All of the animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor. **(3) MEAT GOATS; ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS.** A fair board may, for any meat goat breed category established under sub. (1), establish any of the following entry classes and pay first–place to fourth–place premiums in each entry class at the following applicable levels: (a) Premium level one: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00, \$2.00. 1. Junior doe kid less than 4 months old. 2. Senior doe kid at least 4 months but less than 7 months old. 3. Junior yearling doe at least 7 months but less than 12 months old. 4. Senior yearling doe at least 12 months but less than 24 months old and not in milk. (b) Premium level 2: \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00. 1. Doe at least 2 years but under 3 years old. 2. Doe at least 3 years but under 5 years old. 3. Doe at least 5 years old. 4. Wether less than one year old. 5. Wether at least one year old. 6. Dam and single offspring. The offspring may be a doe or wether. **(4) OTHER GOATS; ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS.** A fair board may, for any goat breed class established under sub. (1) that is not a dairy or meat goat breed class, establish any of the following entry classes and pay first–place to fourth–place premiums for each entry class at the following applicable levels: (a) Premium level one: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00, \$2.00. 1. Junior doe kid less than 4 months old. 2. Senior doe kid at least 4 months but less than 7 months old. 3. Junior yearling doe at least 7 months but less than 12 months old. 4. Senior yearling doe at least 12 months but less than 24 months old and not in milk. (b) Premium level 2: \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00. 1. Doe at least 2 years old but under 3 years old. 2. Doe at least 3 years old but under 5 years old. 3. Doe at least 5 years old. 4. Wether under one year old. 5. Wether at least one year old. 6. Dam and single offspring. The offspring may be a doe or wether. **(5) HORNS.** Goats with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed. **(6) MARKET CLASSES.** A fair board may establish market goat entry classes, based on breed, sex or weight. Goats in each class shall be raised to be sold at market and shall be shown by weight. The fair board may establish weight limits for each entry class but may not limit an entry class by age. If 11 or more goats are entered in any entry class, that class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal subclasses, and each subclass may be judged as a separate class. An exhibitor may enter up to 3 goats in entry classes under this subsection and may receive up to 2 premiums in any entry class under this subsection.

ATCP 160.16 Equines; department 6. (1) REGISTERED DRAFT HORSES AND DRAFT PONIES; RECOGNIZED BREEDS. This subsection applies to draft horses and draft ponies that are registered as members of a recognized breed. Each entry class under pars. (a) to (i) includes all recognized breeds unless an entry class is subdivided by breed at the discretion of

the fair. For each entry class under pars. (a) to (i), or each subclass designated by breed, a fair may receive state aid for first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$11.00, \$9.00, \$7.00 and \$5.00, respectively. (a) Foal; stallion, filly or gelding under one year of age. (b) Gelding; yearling. (c) Gelding; 2 year old. (d) Gelding; 3 year old. (e) Gelding; aged. (f) Stallion; one to 2 years of age. (g) Stallion; 3 years old and over. (h) Filly; one to 2 years of age. (i) Mare; 3 years old and over. **(2) DRAFT HORSES AND DRAFT PONIES; GRADE.** This subsection applies to draft horses and draft ponies that are not registered members of any recognized breed. Flag race. **(5) DONKEYS AND MULES.** A fair board may establish specific entry classes for donkeys and mules. ATCP 160.17 Poultry and poultry products; department 7. (1) ENTRY CLASS AND PREMIUMS; EGGS. A fair board may establish an entry class of poultry eggs and may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25 and \$1.00, respectively. **(2) ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS; MARKET POULTRY.** A fair board may establish an entry class for any of the following market poultry classes, and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50 and \$1.25, respectively:

(a) Yearling hen; determined on past egg production. (b) Capons; 2 birds, each weighing over 7 pounds. (c) Roaster chickens; 2 birds of either sex, each weighing 7.5 to 8.5 pounds and at least 56 days old. (e) Broiler chickens; 2 young birds, each weighing 3.5 to 5.5 pounds and at least 37 days old. ATCP 160.18 Rabbits; department 8. (1) ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS. A fair board may establish any of the following rabbit entry classes for any breed class under sub. (2) and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50 and \$1.25, respectively: (a) Buck under 6 months old. (b) Doe under 6 months old. (c) Buck at least 6 months old. A fair board may establish a separate entry class for bucks 6 to 8 months old if there are a sufficient number of entrants to justify that entry class. (d) Doe at least 6 months old. A fair board may establish a separate entry class for does 6 to 8 months old if there are a sufficient number of entrants to justify that entry class. to fourth-place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50, respectively. **(2) PREMIUM LEVEL TWO.** For each entry class at premium level two, a fair may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$4.50, \$3.50, \$2.50 and \$1.50, respectively. **(3) PREMIUM LEVEL THREE.** For each entry class at premium level three, a fair may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$5.50, \$4.50, \$3.50 and \$2.50, respectively.

A fair board may establish one or more home furnishings entry classes at any of the following premium levels: **(1) PREMIUM LEVEL ONE.** For each entry class at premium level one, a fair may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25 and \$1.00, respectively. **(2) PREMIUM LEVEL TWO.** For each entry class at premium level two, a fair may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50 and \$1.25, respectively. **(3) PREMIUM LEVEL THREE.** For each entry class at premium level three, a fair may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50, respectively. **(4) PREMIUM LEVEL FOUR.** For each entry class at premium level four, a fair may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$4.50, \$3.50, \$2.50 and \$1.50, respectively.

ATCP 160.39 Senior citizens division; general requirements. **(1)** The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over. **(2)** Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division. **(3)** State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the senior citizens division. **(4)** State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item that has been exhibited in the senior citizens division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item.

ATCP 160.40 Uniform premium lists; senior citizens division. At the discretion of the fair, items or articles may be selected from the open division classes in any of the departments specified under subs. **(1)** to **(8)**. Premiums may be paid in the amount of the corresponding premium level for the entry classes in these departments under subchapter II. **(1)** Plants and soil sciences; department 14. **(2)** Flowers and house plants; department 15. **(2m)** Natural sciences; department 16. **(3)** Cultural arts; department 18. **(3m)** Antiques; department 19. **(4)** Photography; department 20. **(4m)** Beer and wine, department 21. **(5)** Woodworking; department 22. **(5m)** Meat products, department 24. **(6)** Foods and nutrition; department 25. **(6m)** Clothing; department 26. **(7)** Knitting and crocheting; department 27. **(8)** Home furnishings; department 28.

ATCP 160.49 Junior fair division; general. **(1)** In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are ages 8 to 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year and exhibitors who are 5 to 9 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year who are exhibiting under s.ATCP 160.65. A fair board may establish specific entry classes within each department. A fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor’s age or grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair. **(2)** All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of a youth organization approved by the fair board. **(3)** Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor’s own labor. An exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves the project, skill area, or supervised occupational experience as an exhibit. **(4)** State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the junior fair division, except for any of the following: (a) A premium may be awarded to each member of a group that collectively owns and enters a livestock exhibit in departments one to 5 of subch. IV. (b) An exhibitor may receive a separate premium for showmanship where authorized under subch. IV. (c) An exhibitor may receive more than one premium in a department for which additional premiums are specifically authorized under subch. IV. **(5)** State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in the junior division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal. **(6)** Special educational exhibits may be established if the proposal is presented to the department before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department. **(7)** Within any junior fair department, a fair may establish special classes where none are specified under this subchapter. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under this

subchapter. **(8)** The fair board may establish specific classes are age or grade level groupings within classes for each of the junior fair departments 14 to 16, 18, 20 to 29, 31, 33, and 34. **(9)** Judging in the junior fair division may be done using the regular, face-to-face, conference or Danish judging system.

ATCP 160.50 Premium lists. The uniform premium lists in this subchapter are the amounts on which state premium aid may be paid to a fair. State premium aid is also limited to the classes set forth in this subchapter. Maximum premiums are listed in dollar amounts for 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th places for each entry class within a premium level.

ATCP 160.505 Self-determined projects. Within each of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, 20 to 29, 33, and 34, a fair board may establish one or more entry classes for self-determined projects that are related to that department. The fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums in each entry class at the applicable levels specified in pars. (a) to (c). Entry classes may be judged using the regular or Danish judging system. (a) Premium level one: \$9.00, \$8.00, \$7.00, \$5.00. 1. Heifer calf; spring. 2. Heifer calf; winter. 3. Heifer calf; fall. (b) Premium level 2: \$11.00, \$9.00, \$7.00, \$5.00. 1. Heifer calf; summer yearling. 2. Heifer calf; spring yearling. 3. Heifer; winter yearling. 4. Heifer; fall yearling. Dry cow at least 3 years old. **(2) SHOWMANSHIP.** A fair board may establish one or more dairy cattle showmanship entry classes, and for each entry class may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50, respectively. The fair board may subdivide entry classes as appropriate. All entry classes shall be judged using the Danish judging system. **(3) ADVENTURES IN DAIRYLAND.** A fair board may establish an "Adventures in Dairyland" entry class. The board may establish this entry class as a dairy cattle entry class under this section, or as an animal and veterinary science entry class under s.

ATCP160.60 (1) (b), but not both. Exhibits in this entry class may include charts, posters, displays or other projects related to the entry class theme, as defined by the fair board. A fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$1.75 \$ 1.50, \$1.25 and \$1.00, respectively.

A fair board may establish classes based on breed or sex. A fair board may establish weight limits for each entry class. If 11 or more animals are entered in any entry class, that class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal subclasses and each subclass may be judged as a separate class. An exhibitor may enter up to 3 animals under this subsection and may receive up to 2 premiums in any entry class under this subsection. For each class established under this subsection, a fair may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$8.00, \$7.00, \$6.00 and \$5.00 respectively. (a) Market beef; light weight. (b) Market beef; medium weight. (c) Market beef; heavy weight. **(3) SHOWMANSHIP.** A fair board may establish one or more beef cattle showmanship entry classes, and for each entry class may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50 respectively. The fair board may subdivide entry classes as appropriate. All entry classes shall be judged using the Danish judging system. **(4) CARCASS CLASS.** An exhibitor may enter a market beef shown at the current fair or another market beef entered only in the carcass class, but each exhibitor is limited to a single entry in the carcass class. Additional requirements may be established by the fair board. The fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00 and \$3.00, respectively. **(5) FEEDER CALF.** The fair board may establish a feeder calf single entry class, or 2 separate entry classes based on weight.

ATCP 160.53 Swine; department 3. (1) BREEDING CLASSES. Exhibits shall consist of recognized breeds, including grade and crossbred females. Entry classes within breed are limited to the categories under pars. (a) to (h) and premiums may be paid in the following level one amounts. Premium level one. \$6.00 5.00 4.00 3.00 (a) Boar; senior spring, January. (b) Boar; senior spring, February. (c) Boar; junior spring pig, March. (d) Sow; Junior yearling. (e) Sow; senior pig. (f) Sow; senior spring, January. (g) Sow; senior spring, February. (h) Sow; junior spring pig, March. **(2) MARKET CLASSES.** A fair board may establish market swine entry classes, based on breed, sex, or weight. Swine in each class shall be raised to be sold at market and shall be shown by weight. The fair board may establish weight limits for each entry class but may not limit an entry class by age. If 11 or more swine are entered in any entry class, that class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal subclasses, and each subclass may be judged as a separate class. An exhibitor may enter up to 3 swine in entry classes under this subsection and may receive up to 2 premiums in any entry class under this subsection. For each entry class established under this subsection, the fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00 and \$3.00. **(3) SHOWMANSHIP.** A fair board may establish one or more swine showmanship entry classes, and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50, respectively. The board may subdivide entry classes as appropriate. All entry classes shall be judged using the Danish judging system. **(4) CARCASS CLASS.** The fair board may establish a swine carcass entry class. The fair board may establish standards for the entry class, and subclasses within the class. An exhibitor may enter only one market pig in the swine carcass class, but that pig may also be entered in a market swine entry class under sub. (2) at the same fair. For the swine carcass class, the fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00 and \$3.00.

ATCP 160.54 Sheep; department 4. (1) BREED CLASSES. (a) A fair may, for any registered breed of sheep, establish an entry class for any of the following categories: 1. Spring ram lamb. 2. Winter ram lamb. 3. Fall ram lamb. 4. Yearling ram. 5. Spring ewe lamb. 6. Winter ewe lamb. 7. Fall ewe lamb. 8. Yearling ewe. 9. Mature ewe. 10. Pair of lambs. 11. Flock. (b) For each entry class established under par. (a), a fair may receive state aid for first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00, respectively. **(2) MARKET CLASSES.** A fair board may establish market lamb entry classes, based on breed, sex, or weight. Lambs in each class shall be raised to be sold at market and shall be shown by weight. The fair board may establish weight limits for each entry class but may not limit an entry class by age. If 11 or more lambs are entered in any entry class, that class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal subclasses, and each subclass may be judged as a separate class. An exhibitor may enter up to 3 lambs in entry classes under this subsection and may receive up to 2 premiums in any entry class under this subsection. For each entry class established under this subsection, a fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00. **(3) SHOWMANSHIP.** A fair board may establish one or more sheep showmanship entry classes. For each showmanship entry class, the fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50. The fair board may subdivide showmanship entry classes as appropriate. All showmanship entry classes shall be judged using the Danish judging system. **(4) CARCASS CLASS.** An exhibitor may enter a market lamb shown at the current fair or another market lamb entered only in the carcass class, but each exhibitor is limited to a single entry in the carcass class. Additional requirements may be established by the fair board. The fair board may pay first–place to fourth place premiums of \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00, and \$3.00, respectively. **(5) MARKET WOOL/FLEECE SHOW CLASS.** A market wool show class or classes may be established at the discretion of the fair board. The fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00, respectively. **(6) DAIRY SHEEP.** A fair board may establish one or more dairy sheep entry classes, and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00, respectively. **(7) SHEARING.** Sheep shown under this section shall meet the following requirements: (a) Wool breeds shall be shown with 2 inches or less of fleece. (b) Dairy breeds shall be slick shorn. (c) Breeds other than those in pars. (a) and (b) shall be shown with not more than one inch of fleece on any part of the animal’s body.

ATCP 160.55 Goats; department 5. (1) BREED CLASSES. A fair board may establish entry classes under subs. (2) to (4) in any of the following breed classes established by the board: (a) A class for any single breed of goats. (b) A “combined purebreds” class consisting of 2 or more breeds, none of which is established as a separate category under par. (a). (c) A class for any recorded grade of goats that is eligible for registry. (d) A class for goats that do not qualify in any category established under pars. (a) to (c). **(2) DAIRY GOATS; ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS.** A fair board may, for any dairy goat breed class established under sub. (1), establish any of the following entry classes and pay first–place to fourth–place premiums in each entry class at the following applicable premium levels: (a) Premium level one: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00, \$2.00. 1. Junior doe kid less than 4 months old. 2. Senior doe kid at least 4 months but less than 7 months old. 3. Junior yearling doe at least 7 months but less than 12 months old. 4. Senior yearling doe at least 12 months but

less than 24 months old and not in milk. (b) Premium level 2: \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00. 1. Yearling milker under 2 years old and in milk. 2. Junior milker at least 2 years old but under 3 years old and in milk. 3. Mature milker at least 3 years old but under 5 years old. 4. Aged milker at least 5 years old. 5. Junior get of sire. A junior get of sire entry shall consist of 3 does under 2 years old that are not in milk and are the get of one sire. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor. 6. Senior get of sire. A senior get of sire entry shall consist of 3 does that are the get of one sire. At least one of the does shall be in milk. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor, but all of the exhibitors shall be in the senior age group. 7. Produce of dam. A produce of dam entry shall consist of 2 does of any age that are the produce of one dam. Both animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor. 8. Dam and daughter. A dam and daughter entry shall consist of one doe of any age and its dam. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor. 9. Exhibitor's herd. An exhibitor's herd entry shall consist of one doe under one year old, one doe at least one year old but less than 2 years old, and one doe at least 2 years old. All of the animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor. **(3) MEAT GOATS; ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS.** A fair board may, for any meat goat breed class established under sub. (1), establish any of the following entry classes and pay first-place to fourth-place premiums in each entry class at the following applicable levels: (a) Premium level one: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00, \$2.00. 1. Junior doe kid less than 4 months old. 2. Senior doe kid at least 4 months but less than 7 months old. 3. Junior yearling doe at least 7 months but less than 12 months old. 4. Senior yearling doe at least 12 months but less than 24 months old and not in milk. (b) Premium level 2: \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00. 1. Doe at least 2 years but under 3 years old. 2. Doe at least 3 years but under 5 years old. 3. Doe at least 5 years old. 4. Wether less than one year old. 5. Wether at least one year old. 6. Dam and single offspring. The offspring may be a doe or wether. **(4) OTHER GOATS; ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS.** A fair board may for any goat breed class established under sub. (1) that is not a dairy or meat goat breed class, establish any of the following entry classes and award first-place to fourth-place premiums for each entry class at the following applicable levels: (a) Premium level one: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00, \$2.00. 1. Junior doe kid less than 4 months old. 2. Senior doe kid at least 4 months but less than 7 months old. 3. Junior yearling doe at least 7 months but less than 12 months old. 4. Senior yearling doe at least 12 months but less than 24 months old and not in milk. (b) Premium level 2: \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00. 1. Doe at least 2 years old but under 3 years old. 2. Doe at least 3 years old but under 5 years old. 3. Doe at least 5 years old. 4. Wether under one year old. 5. Wether at least one year old. 6. Dam and single offspring. The offspring may be a doe or wether. **(5) SHOWMANSHIP.** A fair board may establish one or more goat showmanship entry classes. For each showmanship entry class, the fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50. The fair board may subdivide showmanship entry classes as appropriate. All showmanship entry classes shall be judged using the Danish judging system. **(6) CARCASS CLASS.** An exhibitor may enter a market goat shown at the current fair or another market goat entered only in the carcass class, but each exhibitor is limited to a single entry in the carcass class. Additional requirements may be established by the fair board. The fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00 and \$3.00, respectively. **(7) HORNS.** Goats with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed. **(8) MARKET CLASSES.** A fair board may establish market goat entry classes, based on breed, sex, or weight. Goats in each class shall be raised to be sold at market and shall be shown by weight. The fair board may establish weight limits for each entry class but may not limit an entry class by age. If 11 or more goats are entered in any entry class, that class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal subclasses, and each subclass may be judged as a separate class. An exhibitor may enter up to 3 goats in entry classes under this subsection and may receive up to 2 premiums in any entry class under this subsection. For each entry class established under this subsection, a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00, respectively.

ATCP 160.56 Horses and ponies; department 6. (1) LIGHT HORSES, DRAFT HORSES AND PONIES SHOWMANSHIP AND EQUITATION. A fair may establish separate classes of horse and pony showmanship and equitation under par. (a) or (b). A fair may establish separate classes under each paragraph based on the criteria listed under that paragraph. A fair shall use the Danish judging system for all entries in showmanship and equitation classes. For each class established under this subsection a fair may receive state aid for first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$8.00, \$7.00, \$6.00 and \$5.00, respectively. No animal may be shown for premiums under both pars. (a) and (b) except by another member of the same immediate family. An animal may be shown for ribbons under both pars. (a) and (b) by any individual. (a) *Showmanship.* A fair may establish one or more showmanship classes based on any of the criteria specified under subs. 1. to 5. Judging shall be based on the exhibitor's ability to show the animal at halter. 1. Academic grade level of exhibitor. 2. Beginning, intermediate, or advanced level of showmanship. 3. Size of pony. 4. Type of horse or pony, such as western, English, hunt, show pony, or draft horse. 5. Exhibitor's managerial or ownership status of the exhibited

animal. (b) *Horsemanship or equitation*. A fair may establish one or more reinsmanship or equitation classes based on any of the criteria specified under subds. 1. to 5. Judging shall rate the exhibitor's ability to drive or ride a horse or pony. 1. Academic grade level of exhibitor. 2. Beginning, intermediate, or advanced level of horsemanship. 3. Size of pony. 4. Type of animal such as western, English, hunt or draft. 5. Exhibitor's managerial or ownership status of the exhibited animal. **(1g) LIGHT HORSES, DRAFT HORSES AND PONIES OTHER CLASSES**. A fair may establish separate classes under each paragraph based on the criteria listed under that paragraph. For each class established under this subsection, a fair may award first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$8.00, \$7.00, \$6.00 and \$5.00, respectively. No animal may be shown for multiple premiums under classes in this subsection except by another member of the same immediate family. An animal may be shown for ribbons in multiple classes in this subsection by any individual. (a) *Pleasure*. A fair may establish one or more pleasure mount or pleasure driving classes based on any of the criteria specified under subds. 1. to 7. Judging shall rate the performance of the horse or pony as a pleasure mount or in pleasure driving. 1. Academic grade level of exhibitor. 2. Beginning, intermediate, or advanced level of exhibitor. 3. Size of pony. 4. Pleasure mount or pleasure driving. 5. Type of animal such as western, English, hunt or draft. 6. Roadster. 7. Exhibitor's managerial or ownership status of exhibited animal. (b) *Halter*. A fair may establish one or more halter classes based on any of the criteria specified under subds. 1. to 6. Judging shall rate the conformation of the horse or pony. 1. Age of horse or pony. 2. Size of pony. 3. Sex of animal; mare or gelding. 4. Managerial or ownership. 5. Type or breed of horse or pony. 6. Mare and foal. (c) *Trail or obstacle driving*. A fair may establish one or more horse or pony classes in this category based on any of the criteria specified under subds. 1. to 5. 1. Academic grade level of exhibitor. 2. Beginning, intermediate, or advanced level of exhibitor in trail or obstacle driving. 3. Size of pony. 4. Type of animal such as western, English, hunt or draft. 5. Exhibitor's managerial or ownership status of the exhibited animal. (d) *Gymkhana*. A fair may establish one or more horse or pony classes in this category, including pole bending, barrel racing, plug racing and flag racing. Classes may also be based on any of the criteria specified under subds. 1. to 3. All gymkhana classes are time events. 1. Academic grade level of exhibitor. 2. Beginning, intermediate, or advanced level of exhibitor in gymkhana events. 3. Exhibitor's managerial or ownership status of the exhibited animal. **(1r) ANIMAL LIMIT**. No exhibitor may enter more than 2 animals in all classes established under sub. (1) and (1g). **(2) EQUINE PROJECTS NOT INVOLVING A HORSE OR PONY**. A fair may establish one or more classes of equine–related exhibits that do not include a live horse or pony. Exhibits under this subsection may include charts, posters, displays, and model horse projects. An exhibit entered in a class under this subsection may not be entered in an animal and veterinary science class under s. [ATCP 160.60 \(1\) \(a\)](#). For each class established under this subsection, a fair may receive state aid for first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25 and \$1.00, respectively. **(3) CLOTHING; EQUESTRIAN ATTIRE**. Premiums may be paid all exhibits at the premium level under s. [ATCP 160.72 \(3\)](#) in the clothing department of the junior fair division.

ATCP 160.57 Poultry and poultry products; department 7. (1) ENTRY CLASS AND PREMIUMS; EGGS. A fair board may establish an entry class of poultry eggs and may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25 and \$1.00, respectively. **(2) ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS; MARKET POULTRY**. A fair board may establish an entry class for any of the following market poultry classes, and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50 and \$1.25, respectively: (a) Yearling hen; determined on past egg production. (b) Capons; 2 birds, each weighing over 7 pounds. (c) Roaster chickens; 2 birds of either sex, each weighing 7.5 to 8.5 pounds. (e) Broiler chickens; 2 young birds, each weighing 3.5 to 5.5 pounds and at least 37 days old. (em) Broiler chickens; 2 birds, each weighing 5.5 to 6.5 pounds and at least 37 days old. (f) Young duck; either sex, weighing 5 pounds or more. (g) Young geese; either sex, weighing 7 pounds or more. (h) Young turkey; either sex, over 15 weeks of age. **(3) ENTRY CLASSES AND PREMIUMS; POULTRY BREEDS**. A fair board may establish any of the following entry classes for any breed class under par. (b), and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50 and \$1.25, respectively: (a) Poultry other than pigeons. 1. Old male. 2. Old female. 3. Young male. 4. Young female. (b) Pigeons. 1. Old cock. 2. Old hen. 3. Young cock. 4. Young hen. (c) A poultry breed class may consist of one or more poultry breeds within any of the following groups, provided that no individual breed is included in more than one breed class: 1. American breeds. 2. Mediterranean breeds. 3. Crossbreeds. 4. Asiatic breeds. 5. English breeds. 6. Bantam breeds. 7. Other standard breeds. 8. Ducks. 9. Geese. 10. Turkeys. 11. Pigeons. 12. Guinea fowl. **(4) SHOWMANSHIP**. A fair board may establish one or more poultry showmanship entry classes, and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50, respectively. The board may subdivide entry classes as appropriate. All entry classes shall be judged using the Danish system.

ATCP 160.58 Rabbits; department 8. (1) BREED CLASSES. Breed classes set forth under s. [ATCP 160.18 \(2\)](#) are the breed entry classes under this subsection. The fair board may limit the number of breeds which a single exhibitor may show.

(2) ENTRY CLASSES. Entry classes within breeds are limited to the categories under par. (a) 1. to 6. and premiums for all exhibits may be paid in the following level one amounts. Premium level one \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 (a) *Age categories.* The age categories under subds. 1. to 6. may be used to establish classes in addition to the breed classes under sub. (1). The intermediate age category for bucks and does under subds. 3. and 4. may be established by the fair board if there is sufficient number of entrants to justify the additional classes. 1. Buck under 6 months of age. 2. Doe under 6 months of age. 3. Buck; 6 to 8 months of age. 4. Doe; 6 to 8 months of age. 5. Buck over 8 months of age. 6. Doe over 8 months of age. (b) *Meat pen.* A meat pen exhibit shall consist of 3 rabbits, all of which shall be of the same breed and variety. No rabbit may be over 69 days old nor weigh over 5.5 pounds. Rabbits entered in this exhibit may not be entered in any other class. (c) *Single fryer.* Any rabbit entered as a single fryer may not be over 69 days old nor weigh over 5.5 pounds. The rabbit may not be entered in any other class (d) *Roaster rabbit.* The exhibit consists of a single rabbit of either sex, between 70 and 180 days old, weighing not less than 5 pounds and which may not be entered in another class. (e) *Crossbred rabbit.* The exhibit consists a single rabbit of either sex in one of the following age subcategories. 1. Over 6 months of age. 2. Under 6 months of age. (f) *Pet rabbit.* The exhibit consists of a single rabbit of either sex, over 6 months of age, which is shown in no other class under this section. **(3) SHOWMANSHIP.** A fair board may establish one or more rabbit showmanship entry classes, and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50, respectively. The board may subdivide entry classes as appropriate. All entry classes shall be judged using the Danish judging system.

ATCP 160.59 Dogs; department 9. (1) ENTRY CLASSES. A fair board may establish one or more dog entry classes in any of the categories under pars. (a) to (k), and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$4.50, \$3.50, \$2.50 and \$1.50 respectively. All dogs which are entered as exhibits under this section shall have current distemper and rabies vaccinations. (a) Pre–novice A. The exhibitor has had no previous experience in training a dog. The class may be subdivided into groups based on academic grade level or grade level groupings of exhibitors. (b) Pre–novice B. The exhibitor has had previous experience in training a dog, but is now training an untrained dog, or an inexperienced exhibitor is showing a previously trained dog. (c) Novice (d) Graduate novice (e) Pre–open (f) Open (g) Pre–utility (h) Utility (i) Agility. (j) Brace. (k) Team classes. **(2) SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES.** A fair board may establish one or more dog showmanship entry classes, and for each entry class may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$3.00, \$2.50, \$2.00 and \$1.50, respectively. All entry classes shall be judged using the Danish judging system.

ATCP 160.60 Animal and veterinary science; department 10. Exhibits in this department may consist of live animals or projects without live animals. **(1) PROJECT ENTRY CLASSES.** Premiums may be paid all exhibits in pars. (a) and (b) in the following level one amounts. Premium level one \$1.75 1.50 1.25 1.00 (a) *Projects without live animals.* This category includes charts, displays, posters, equipment or other projects involving animal and veterinary science which do not include live animals. (b) *Adventures in dairyland projects.* This category includes posters, charts, displays, and projects. The fair board may designate this exhibit as either a dairy cattle class or an animal and veterinary science class, but not both. **(2) LIVE SPECIAL INTEREST ANIMAL ENTRY CLASSES.** A fair may establish entry classes for special interest animals, including caged birds, reptiles, rodents, cavy, and small indoor pets, for which no other class has been established. A class established under this subsection shall include at least 6 entries of the same species, except that a fair may establish a class of “any other animals” which may include more than one species and fewer than 6 animals per species. Suggested classes for caged birds and cavy are set forth in pars. (a) and (b). For each class established under this subsection, a fair may receive state aid for first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$2.00, \$1.75, \$.150 and \$1.25, respectively. (a) *Suggested classes for cage birds.* Each of the classes listed in this paragraph may be divided into separate classes for adult males and adult females. Young birds that do not have plumage may not be exhibited. 1. Hard bills including finches, canaries and weavers 2. Soft bills including mynas, jays and toucans 3. Psittacines (parrot and parrot–like birds) (b) *Suggested classes for cavy.* 1. Breed classes a. American b. Abyssinian c. Peruvian d. Crested e. Teddy f. Any other recognized breed 2. Sub–categories of cavy classes; each of the breeds under subd. 1. may be divided into separate boar and sow classes as well as the following age and weight groupings. a. Young; up to 4 months of age and less than 22 ounces b. Intermediate; 4 to 6 months old and 22 to 30 ounces c. Old; over 6 months of age and over 30 ounces.

ATCP 160.61 Llamas, alpacas and domesticated exotic animals; department 11. A fair may establish an entry class for exotic domestic animals in any of the categories specified under subs. (1) to (4). For each class established under this section, a fair may receive state aid for first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00, respectively. **(1) Emu. (2) Ostrich. (3) Llamas and alpacas.** A fair board may award up to 2 premiums for the exhibition of

a single llama or alpaca, including no more than one premium in each of the following classes: (a) The exhibitor's showmanship. (b) The performance of the llama or alpaca. Performance may be judged in any of the following performance categories: 1. Obstacle. 2. Pack. 3. Public relations. 4. Driving and costume. **(4)** Exotic domestic animals.

ATCP 160.615 Cats; department 13. A fair may establish entry classes for cats in any of the categories specified under subs. **(1)** and **(2)**. Mixed breed and purebred cats shall be shown in the same class unless the number of entries warrants the creation of separate classes. A fair may establish additional purebred classes if more than 6 purebreds would otherwise be shown in any class. For each class established under this section a fair may receive state aid for first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50 and \$1.25, respectively. **(1)** A fair may establish entry classes for kittens 4 to 12 months old in any of the following categories: (a) Male kittens; short hair. (b) Male kittens; long hair. (c) Female kittens; short hair. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one. \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two. \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three. \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.63 Flowers and house plants; department 15. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving flowers, home landscaping, grounds landscaping, house plants and plant crafts. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.64 Natural sciences; department 16. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving bees, birds, entomology, fishing, nature space, outdoor adventures, recycling, shooting sports, trees, water, wildflowers, wildlife habitat, and other natural sciences and environmental education projects. For each entry class a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board. **(1)** Premium level one. \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two. \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three. \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.65 Youth organizations' early childhood categories; department 17. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving children who are 5 – 9 years old as of January 1 of the current fair year. A child who is 9 years old may only exhibit in this department if the child is a first time fair exhibitor. The fair board may establish specific classes and age or grade level groupings within classes. The entry classes are open to members of youth organizations. For each entry class, a fair board may pay a single premium of \$1.50 per entry. If using the Danish system, a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums of \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50 and \$1.25, respectively.

ATCP 160.66 Cultural art; department 18. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving drama, theater arts, folk arts, music, visual arts and crafts, and other cultural arts projects, including computer-generated art. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one. \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two. \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three. \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.67 Photography; department 20. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving computer-enhanced photos, photographic prints, photographic slides, videos, and other photography projects. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one. \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two. \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three. \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.675 Computers; department 21. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving computers and other related computer projects. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one. \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two. \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three. \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.68 Woodworking; department 22. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving woodworking and other wood science projects. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following amounts designated by the fair board. **(1)** Premium level one \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.69 Electricity; department 23. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving electricity, electronics, and other electricity projects. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

For each entry class, a fair may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.75 Family and child development; department 29. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving child development and other family development projects. For each entry class, a fair may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.76 Demonstrations and presentations; department 31. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving action exhibits, demonstrations, illustrated talks, journals, other graphic or oral presentations, and other communications projects. For each entry class, a fair may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25 Team entries.

ATCP 160.77 Youth group booths, banners and scrapbooks; department 32. A fair board may establish entry classes related to youth group booths, banners and scrapbooks. Exhibitors shall have made each exhibit, in its entirety, subsequent to the closing date of the prior year’s fair. For a scrapbook or banner entry class, the fair board may pay first–place to fourth– place premiums of \$8.00, \$6.00, \$4.00 and \$2.00. For a booth entry class, the fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$16.00, \$14.00, \$12.00 and \$10.00.

ATCP 160.78 Youth leadership; department 33. A fair board may establish entry classes for projects involving financial management, youth leadership, or financial management and youth leadership. For each entry class, a fair may pay

first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one. \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two. \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three. \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.79 Health and citizenship; department 34. A fair board may establish entry classes comprised of projects involving careers, citizenship, cultural heritage, health, history, inter–generational programs, international relations, safety, and other similar projects. For each entry class, a fair may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the fair board: **(1)** Premium level one. \$2.00 1.75 1.50 1.25 **(2)** Premium level two. \$2.50 2.25 2.00 1.75 **(3)** Premium level three. \$3.00 2.75 2.50 2.25

ATCP 160.80 Educational and school exhibits; department 35. (1) GENERAL. (a) No state premium aid may be paid on education department premiums unless the fair board files with the department a complete list of exhibitors. (b) All educational exhibits shall be displayed at the fair. **(2) SCHOOL BOOTH SYSTEM.** (a) The exhibit shall consist of a school booth display representing the entire school or a subject taught within the school. Each school is limited to one entry under the school booth system. The subject matter for exhibits include any subject taught in the school during the school year. (b) Judging shall be based on factors such as arrangement, theme, entry, eye appeal, and creativeness. (c) Premiums on school booth displays shall be paid to the school. The fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$75.00, \$70.00, \$65.00 and \$60.00. **(3) STUDENT GROUP DISPLAYS.** (a) The exhibit shall consist of a student group other than a student group representing the entire school. The exhibit may not be displayed as part of a school booth exhibit. Exhibits entered under student group displays shall meet all of the following requirements: 1. Include school name, teacher’s name, name and address of student, and exhibitor’s number on the official entry form. 2. Be entered under the name of the school with participating grades listed on the entry. 3. Be comprised of school work completed during the current school year. (b) Student group displays shall be judged on originality, creativeness, quality, subject material, art media, individual and group work, attractive arrangement, and percentage of pupils participating. (c) Premiums on student group displays may be paid to the teacher or to the school. The fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$12.00, \$10.00, \$8.00 and \$6.00. **(4) INDIVIDUAL STUDENT ENTRIES.** (a) The exhibit is entered by an individual student, including special education students. The exhibit may not be displayed as part of a school booth exhibit or a student group display. Specific classes for individual competition for all grade levels may be selected by the fair board. Individual students may enter only one exhibit in each class. Exhibits entered under an individual shall meet all of the following requirements: 1. Include school name, teacher’s name, name and address of student, and exhibitor’s number on the official entry form. 2. List all entries on one official entry blank. 3. Be comprised of school work completed during the current school year. (b) Premiums on individual student exhibits are paid to the individual exhibitor. The fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums of \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25 and \$1.00.

ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations. (1) Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department. **(1m)** (a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years. (b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year. (c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. **(b)** in cases of unanticipated emergency situations. **(2)** Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair’s premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair. **(3)** No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class. **(4)** (a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division. (b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups. (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors. **(4g)** When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. **(4) (b)** and **(c)** to award placements in a class. **(5)** If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first–place, one second–place, one third–place and one fourth–place award in that class.

ATCP 160.92 Accounting requirements. (1) All receipts from any source whatsoever shall be deposited in a bank, and all accounts without exception shall be paid by check or draft. All records, including judging sheets, papers, stubs, checks, vouchers or other orders relating to fair transactions shall be preserved for a 6-year period subsequent to the year in which they were made or issued. (2) Premiums shall be actually paid or bona fide notice of premium awards sent to all premium winners before a claim for state aid may be considered. (3) The authorized fair representative claiming state aid shall file with the department within 30 days after the close of the fair, an affidavit which shall include all of the following documents: (a) A list of premiums actually paid or to be paid listed by department. (b) An index of exhibitors and their addresses, with amounts paid in premiums opposite each name. (c) One premium book. (d) A summary of all judges utilized by the fair including their registration numbers. (e) An affidavit from each judge indicating the departments and classes judged at the fair. (f) Horse exhibitors' registrations. (4) The authorized fair representative shall submit, on or before January 31 following the year in which the fair is held, the annual financial report verified on oath which shall include the receipts and disbursements, and the fair attendance. State aid received for the current year shall be included as a receipt in the annual financial report.

ATCP 160.93 Authority. This chapter is adopted under authority of s. 93.23 (1), Stats.

Animal Health Regulations Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2023 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so always check datcp.wi.gov or contact us for current information. Fairs or exhibitions may have additional requirements. Exhibitors should contact the event organizers for more information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EVENT ORGANIZERS

All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- Animal identification (number, type, description, and, when required, official identification (see requirements for different animals below)
- Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
- Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
- Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when required, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below)
- For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment
- For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment

Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.

Note: Except in specific circumstances, if any animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead, the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)

These regulations apply to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.

DISEASES

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.08(1), Wis. Admin. Code)

Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts, or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

CATTLE and BISON

Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.

Cattle from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.22, Wis. Admin. Code) must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a documenting official animal identification (ID) and all required tests and certifications
- Have official individual ID (including steers)^b
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx)

Acceptable animal IDs^b for all cattle from outside Wisconsin

- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag); this includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag
- 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID)
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
 - Manufacturer-coded RFID tag - 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
 - American ID tag – 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin

Tuberculosis (TB) requirements^c for cattle from outside Wisconsin

As of 1/1/23, all cattle from **Texas** and **Michigan's TB Free Zone** (for cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone see below), regardless of sex or age are required to have a negative TB test within 60 days prior to import.

Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone – Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, and Oscoda counties - (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:

- Import permit
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^c
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show^d.

SWINE

Note: These regulations apply to all swine, including pet pigs and racing pigs.

Swine from within Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.32(2) and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a:

Note: *Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.*

- Stating that the entire herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and no apparent disease was present at the time of inspection^d.
- Non-terminal Exhibitions: All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PED^v (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition^c. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI.
- Terminal Exhibitions: No testing requirements.^c

Note: *Terminal Exhibitions are those at which all the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale. If going to a slaughter only market sale, contact the Division of Animal Health fair inspector for required information to collect.*

Note: *If the fair intends to use a load-out facility, contact the Division of Animal Health in advance to discuss requirements that must be met.*

Swine from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.30 and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a that includes the following:

- The negative results of the PRRS test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- The negative results of the PEDv test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection.^d
- Official individual identification (ID)^b

Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:

- USDA silver ear tag
- USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID
- Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered
- An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered

Note: Microchips are not accepted as official ID for any swine including pet pigs.

SHEEP and GOATS

Note: *These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. See Exotic Ruminants below.*

Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin need:

- If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID)^b at any age.
- If not sexually intact, need official individual ID^b if they are 12 months or older.
- See below for Official ID options.
- Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment.

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.69, 10.76, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual ID^b for all animals.
- See below for Official ID options.
- See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone.
- Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment.

Official Identification^b includes:

- Scrapie eartags (including tags on neckstraps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos – see DATCP Website*)
- USDA 840 ear tags
- Legible breed tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Legible scrapie tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Approved microchips (Electronic Identification/EID) – There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos. See DATCP Website* and NOTE below.
- **NOTE:** *All sheep and goats that go through a market or to slaughter and require Official Identification must be ear tagged with Official ID. Official ID in the form of a tattoo or Electronic Implantable Identification (EID) is no longer sufficient when moving through a market or going to slaughter.*
- **NOTE:** *If a Wisconsin origin animal is neutered, less than 12 months of age, and moving through a market after the fair, the market may require Official ID in the form of an ear tag.*

Goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis (TB) Modified Accredited Zone –Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, Oscoda counties- also need:

- Import permit^e
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^c
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show.^d

EQUINE

Equine animals from within Wisconsin need documentation of a negative EIA (Coggins) test^e done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). No test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams. Documentation may be:

- Official test report VS 10-11, or
- USDA-approved electronic test form, or
- Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or
- Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

Equine animals from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.36, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a which clearly identifies^b the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip
- Negative EIA (Coggins) test^c done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI
- No EIA test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams

Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if:

- Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin
- The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days
- Proof of a negative EIA (Coggins) test^e in previous 12 months accompanies the animal

POULTRY and WATERFOWL

(Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need ONE of the following:

- An NPIP certificate stating the flock of origin is a US pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys a *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* clean flock or NPIP affiliate flock^c or
- Documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Tested Flock and has tested negative for pullorum-typhoid and for turkeys *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*^c, or
- Documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Associate Flock^c, or
- Individual tests for sexually mature birds (turkeys over 6 months, all other birds over 4 months) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band identification (ID). All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*. After testing there can be no change of ownership or commingling with other birds that are not part of the flock except at other shows/fairs.

Note: Flock of origin means the flock in which the birds currently reside, likely the exhibitor's flock. Once purchased birds are added to the buyer's flock, even if the buyer's flock only consists of one or just a few birds, the buyer's flock is the flock of origin and that flock must meet NPIP or WI Tested or Associate Flock status to avoid individual bird testing for shows/fairs.

Poultry and waterfowl from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.42, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) specifically showing movement to the fair or show that states:

- They originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program^c, or

- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* for turkeys) within 90 days^c before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID^b.

Not required:

- Import permit number

EXOTIC RUMINANTS

Note: *Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats. In addition, please contact your county and local municipality for any restrictions.*

Exotic ruminants from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Exotic ruminants from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.82, Wis. Admin. Code) must have

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
- Official individual identification (ID) as required for tuberculosis and brucellosis testing^b
- Import permit^e
- Proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for:
 - o Tuberculosis (TB) – negative test required within 60 days before entry^c
 - o Brucellosis – negative test required within 30 days before entry^c

Please call 608-224-4872 beforehand to determine which TB test to use.

SOUTH AMERICAN CAMELIDS: LLAMAS, ALPACAS, GUANACOS, VICUÑAS

South American camelids from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

South American camelids from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.85, Wis. Admin. Code) must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual identification (ID)^b. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- Microchip number
- Breed association registration number
- Breed association tattoo

**SMALL ANIMALS: DOGS, DOMESTIC CATS, AND OTHER HOUSEHOLD PETS
(Ferrets, pet birds, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, domestic mice and rats)**

Note: *For animals that are part of menageries, see also rules below for menageries. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. Dog hybrids, domestic cat hybrids, or exotic small cat species such as servals fall under rules for Exotic small animals. Native wild animals and birds, including raptors, and captive wild animals such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks fall under rules for wild animals.*

Dogs from within Wisconsin (Ref. s.95.21, Wis. Stats.) that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.^f

Cats and other household pets from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Dogs and cats from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.80, Wis. Admin. Code) that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated against rabies^f by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)^a stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date.

Other household pets from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.06, Wis. Admin. Code) need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)^a but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1-800-232-4636).

EXOTIC SMALL ANIMALS

(Any species not covered by “small animals” above, exotic large animals, and other wild animals)

Note: *Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.*

Animals from within Wisconsin do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.^f

Animals from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.84, Wis. Admin. Code) generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
- Import permit number^e

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin.^f These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines, and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See <http://dnr.wi.gov>

CIRCUS, RODEO, RACING AND MENAGERIE ANIMALS

Note: *Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.*

Animals from within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations, identification, and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numbers^e (Ref. s.ATCP 10.81, Wis. Admin. Code) if they are:

- Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines, and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Department of Natural Resources. See

GUIDELINES FOR HOUSING AND MANAGING ANIMALS

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease by ELISA test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used on the grounds before, during, and after the show

- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- House cattle separately from South American camelids and other exotic ruminants
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones
